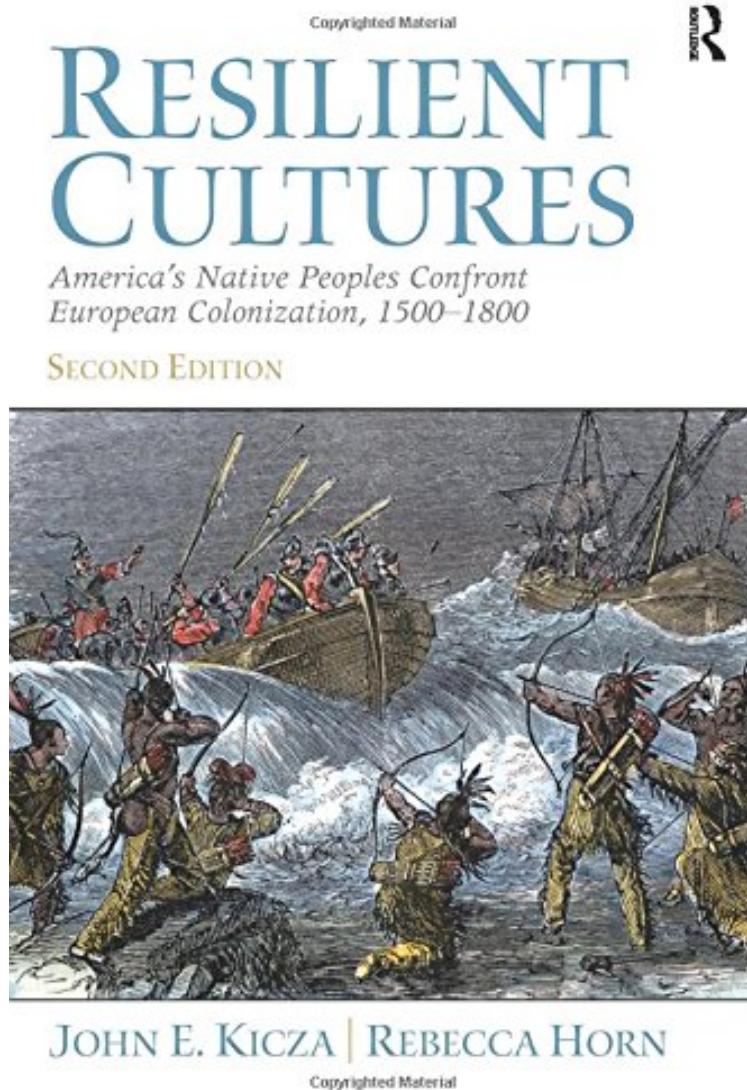

This book provides a comparative perspective of the impact of early European colonization on the native peoples of the Americas. It covers the character of the indigenous cultures before contact, and then addresses the impact of and creative ways in which they adapted to the establishment of colonies by the Spanish, Portuguese, French, Dutch, and English. Key topics: Paying attention to environmental change, the book considers such issues as the nature of military conflicts, the cultural and material contributions of each side to the other, the importance of economic exchanges, and the demographic transformation. About the Author John E. Kicza is the former department of history co-chair at Washington State University. He was as an associate dean of the college of liberal arts at WSU from 2001-2005 and served on the graduate faculty of the American studies program. He is also a former Edward R. Meyer distinguished professor. Kicza received his Ph.D. from UCLA in 1979. His fields of expertise are Latin American history and early European overseas culture contacts. His books include *The Indian in Latin American History: Resistance, Resilience, and Acculturation* (Scholarly Resources, 2000) and *The Social History of Spanish America in the National Period* (Academia Nacional de la Historia de Venezuela, 1998). His articles, chapters and entries have appeared in such journals as the *William and Mary Quarterly*, *Hispanic American Historical*, *Renaissance Quarterly* and the *Latin American Research*. He retired in June 2009.
