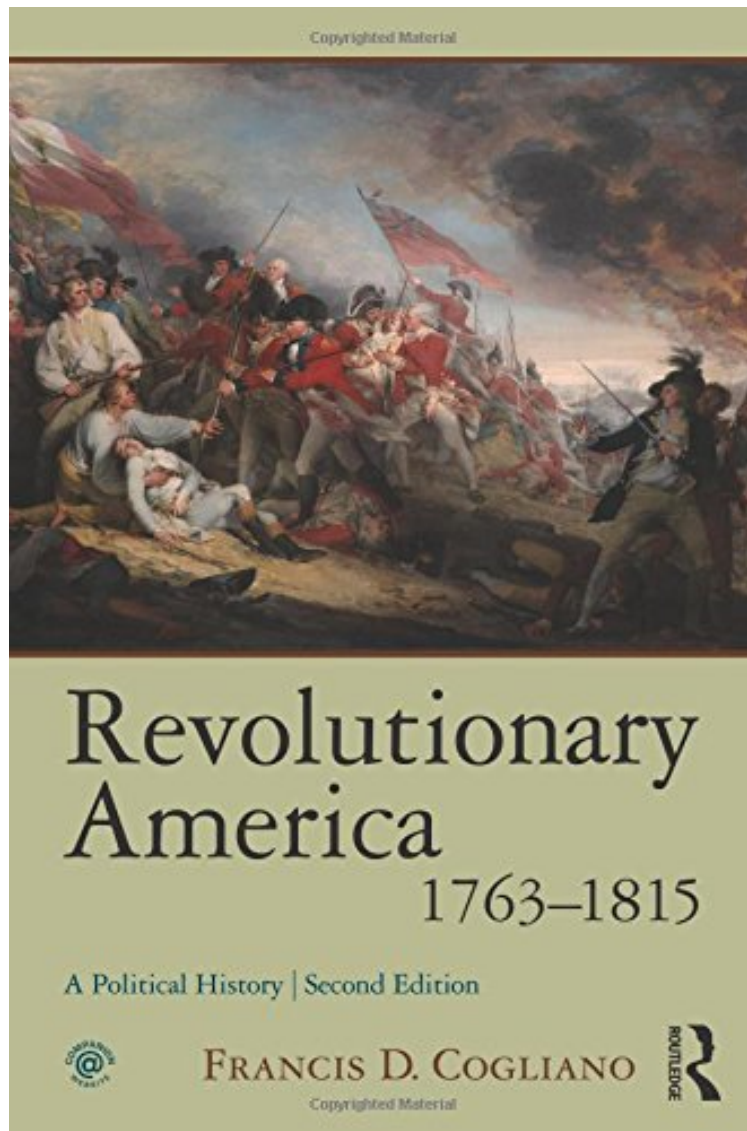

I prefer history texts that utilize these tools for better organization. There is great detail on the Imperial Crisis leading up to the war, and a good description on the problems the early republic had to deal with. It is a little lax on the actual details of the war so if you are looking for a military description of the revolutionary war, this is not it. For an amazing text on this era, I recommend "The Glorious Cause" by Middlekauff. This Cogliano text serves its purpose as a general and brief description of the revolutionary war period from the end of the Seven Years War through the War of 1812.
