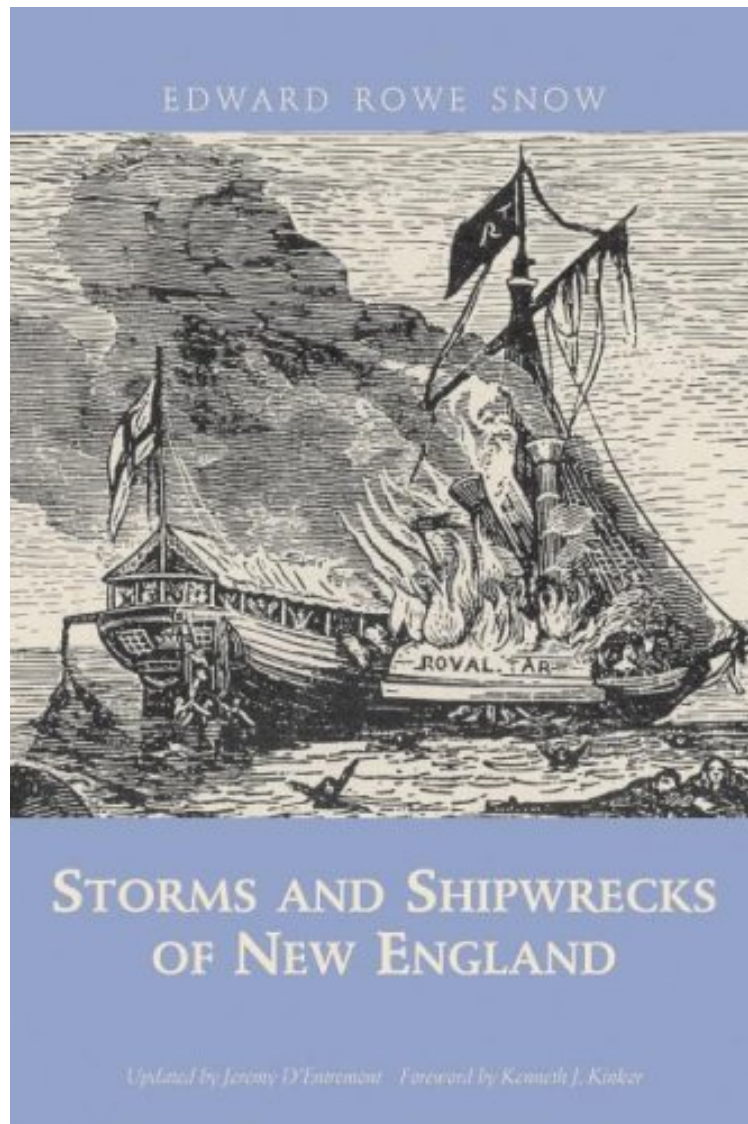

A classic by Edward Rowe Snow, first published in 1943 and updated in 1944 and again in 1946, *Storms and Shipwrecks of New England* relates what William P. Quinn calls ""stories of stormy adventure."" Jeremy D'Entremont has provided annotations to Snow's chapters, covering the pirate ship *Whidah*, the wreck of the *City of Columbus*, the *Portland Gale*, the 1938 hurricane, and more, bringing the information about the storms and shipwrecks up to date.

From the Publisher Snow is fondly remembered as the "Flying Santa." For forty years he flew in small planes and helicopters over the lighthouses of New England, dropping Christmas parcels for the keepers and their families. His efforts to preserve the islands of Boston Harbor as public lands are less well known. After his death in 1982, the *Boston Globe* lauded his support for conservation: "There are many political leaders and environmentalists who can justly share the credit for the preservation of the harbor islands, but among them Mr. Snow will hold a special place as a link to their past and a guide to their present." About the Author Edward Rowe Snow was a masterful storyteller famous for his tales of the sea and New England history.
